#### 1. INTRODUCTION

Govt. Digvijay Autonomous P.G. College, Rajnandgaon, CG is one of the premier Institutions of Chhattisgarh, founded by the visionary personality, Late Mahant Raja Digvijay Das ji on 13th July 1957 to fulfill his dream of a centre of higher education in Rajnandgaon. He donated his own palace for the college to establish a centre of higher education in Rajnandgaon. The college keeps fidelity to its vision of an educational institution with social responsibility and commitment to humanity as a whole. The institution, surrounded by lakes from three sides, has plenty of natural and scenic beauty. From 1957 the college was being run as a private college and was taken over by the government in 1973. Till 2015, the college was affiliated with PTRSU, Raipur (CG), but came under the jurisdiction of Hemchand Yadav University, Durg (CG) in 2015. We celebrated 'Golden Jubilee year' in 2007 & 'Diamond Jubilee year' in 2018.

One of the leading Colleges of Chhattisgarh, our institution has 19 Government colleges and 4 private colleges under its jurisdiction. Being one of the few autonomous colleges of the state, it runs 06 programs at UG and 18 programmes at PG level. Started with the strength of 74 students today it encompasses more than 6500 regular students, the largest strength in Chhattisgarh. Around 10000 appear in examinations as private candidates and 1000 appear for the Open University centres; IGNOU and Sunderlal Sharma. The institution has a support system for Naxal affected, economically challenged and Specially-abled students. The college has a glorious history with the literary personalities of international fame, Gajanan Madhav Muktibodh, Padumlal Punnalal Bakshi and Baldeo Prasad Mishra; as faculty members. The

museum honing their manuscripts is situated within the college campus as a part of the institution.

The college has developed its infrastructure and facilities using effectively the grants received from the state government, UGC, RUSA, Alumni Contribution, CPE & development fund from MPs and MLAs of the constituency. The college was given the status of Potential for Excellence (CPE phase-I) for its good academic record and environment in the year 2010. Our alumni occupy distinguished positions in various walks of life.

#### **4.1 Executive Summary**

### 8. Plan Targets for Institution

#### **Action Plan**

- Consultation with Construction agency such as P.W.D./ Municipality etc. for preparing work/Construction estimate and handing over details about construction site and details about construction size/Renovation part/Improvement site etc.
- ♦ Once funds are allocated, by D.H.E., there after M.O.U. will be signed with the construction agency and transfer of funds will be done on part basis as per guidelines already exist, or be given by D.H.E. (C.G.).
- ❖ After completion of steps mentioned in previous point No. 1 and No. 2 the college administration will ensure the tendering procedure and work order.
- College administration will look after/ monitor the work of the work site regularly till the completion of work.
- ❖ Finally after completion of works final payment will be done and will take over all that from the construction agency.
- Regarding procurement work like purchasing of equipment, reference books and IT related devices; the purchase work shall be done according to rules already laid down by the department of higher education, (C.G.).

### 8.2 Provide the feasibility and sustainability of the Plan targets for Institution:

For the Sustainability of created infrastructure and procured items. Following measures shall be taken into account, although existing infrastructure and all other assets of the college are being looked after well.

- ❖ By Constituting various committees for various types of work where teaching and non teaching staff shall be put in for performing various functions as per need and directive shall be given by principal.
- For meeting our recurring maintenance expenditure, the college will manage its funding through its Janbhagidari Samiti, where sufficient funds are available.

The college has developed its infrastructure and facilities using effectively the grants received from the state government, UGC, RUSA, CPE & development fund from MPs and MLAs of the constituency. The funds received previously y the institution have been used strategically for the benefit of the stakeholders and if the institution receive the IDP grant, the proposals, we have received from all the departments will be worked upon and finalized.
